Under the Bonnet: Confessions of a 1970s and '80s Car Mechanic

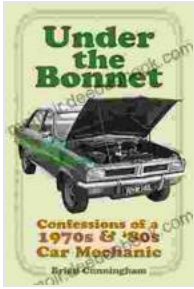

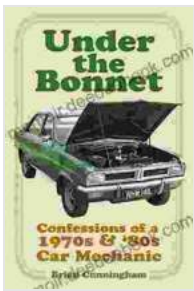
