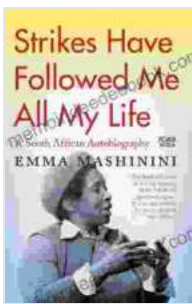


Strikes Have Followed Me All My Life

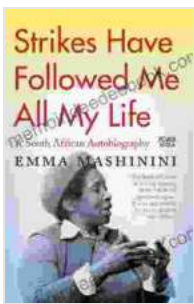
